ALBRIGHTON, near Shrewsbury, is a chapelry
 and, with Perrill and Broadoak, was formed into an eccl-
 siastical parish from the parish of St. Mary, Shrews-
 bury, Oct. 30, 1860; it is 2 miles south-west from Had-
 nall station on the Shrewsbury and Crewe branch of the
 London and North Western railway and 3¼ north from
 Shrewsbury, in the Northern division of the county,
 Pimhill hundred, Ateam union, Shrewsbury county
 court district, rural deanery of Wem, archdeaconry of
 Salop and diocese of Lichfield. The petty sessions for
 this division are held at the Shire Hall, Shrewsbury,
 the last Wednesday in each month. For magistrates and
 places in the division see Shrewsbury. The church of
 St. John the Baptist is a building of stone in the Early
 Norman style, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch
 and a western turret containing one bell: the font is
 Norman: there are 100 sittings. The register dates
 from the year 1663; the earlier register, dating from
 1563, is lost. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value
 £60, with residence, in the gift of W. A. Sparrow esq.
 and held since 1907 by the Rev. Reginald Swayne
 Bartram B.A. of Oxford University. Albrighton Hall is

ALVELEY is a parish and large village, pleasantly
 seated on the eastern bank of the river Severn, over
 which there are ferries to Hampton Loade and Highley
 stations, three-quarters of a mile north-east from Highley
 station of the Severn Valley branch of the Great Western
 railway, 7 miles north-west from Kidderminster, 6 south-
 south-east from Bridgnorth, 9 north-north-west from
 Bewdley and 8 north-east from Cleobury Mortimer, in
 the Southern division of the county, Chelmarsh division
 of the hundred of Stottesden, Bridgnorth union, petty
 sessional division and county court district, rural deanery
 of Bridgnorth, archdeaconry of Ludlow and diocese of
 Hereford. The church of St. Mary, dating originally
 from 1140, is a building of stone, in the Norman, Early
 English and later styles, consisting of chancel, cler-
 storied nave with chantry on the south side, aisles,
 south porch and an embattled western tower with
 pinnacles, containing 7 bells: the upper part of the
 tower was added in 1777: the aisles and the south
 chantry contain mural tablets to the Grove, Dovey,
 Potter, Bache, Nechell, Lee and Wakeman families,
 and the chantry retains an ancient altar slab found
 during the restoration in the nave: on the walls
 of this chantry are remains of two paintings illus-
 trating "the Fall and Redemption of Mankind;" on
 the south wall, over the piscina, is a representation of
 the "Fall" and in the centre is a large allegorical
 figure illustrating the "Triumph of Woman over Evil
 through the Incarnation:" preserved in a case against
 the wall of the north aisle is an altar frontal, discovered
 in an old chest belonging to the church, and dating
 from about 1470: the central design represents "Souls
 in the bosom of Abraham," and on either side are
 fleurs-de-lis and angels with scrolls bearing the words
 "Da gloriam Deo:" in this wall is a blocked doorway,
 closed since 1585, and above it a tablet bearing the

name, John Davis, Freemason, 1585: the chancel retains
 piscina and triple sedilia, and several of the windows
 are stained: beneath the tower arch is a brass with
 effigy and inscription to John Grove, gentleman and a
 freeman of the Grocers' Company of London; he was a
 benefactor to the parish, and died 11 Dec. 1616, aged
 56; over the effigy are his arms and those of the
 Grocers' Company: some stone coffins lie in the church-
 yard, and near the porch is the headless shaft of
 a large cross; in 1878-9 the church was thoroughly
 restored from plans by the late Sir A. W. Blomfield
 A.B.A., F.S.A. architect, of London, at a cost of £4,000,
 when the bells were re-hung at the cost of B. J. G.
 Griffiths esq: a pulpit of Alveley stone was added in
 1911 to commemorate the coronation of H.M. King
 George V. The register dates from the year 1561.
 The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £102, with a
 house including glebe at Cwm Mawr, Radnorshire, and
 in the Vale of Evesham, in the gift of Lieut.-Col.
 Edward Maltby Wakeman J.P. and held since 1898 by
 the Rev. John Francis Gatliff M.A., L.Th. of Durham
 University. The benefice was formerly held by Henry
 De Wingham in 1253, and William of Wykeham, 1366;
 the former became Bishop of London in 1259; the
 latter Bishop of Winchester in 1367; both were Lord
 Chancellors of England. Here is a Primitive Methodist
 chapel. The charities are of £141 yearly value, of
 which John Grove esq. a native of the parish, in 1616
 bequeathed a sum of money producing £20 yearly, £10
 to be paid yearly to a schoolmaster in the parish, and
 £10 to be given to five aged, impotent men. Good
 white and red sandstone, suitable for building and
 grinding purposes is quarried here at the Hay and Hall
 Close quarries, giving employment to a number of the
 villagers. Cotton Hall is the residence of Lieut.-Col.
 Edward Maltby Wakeman J.P. lord of the manor of

Nordley Regis. John Skipworth Gibbons esq. of Bodington Manor, Cheltenham, is lord of the manor of Alveley. The principal landowners are J. S. Gibbons esq. William Henry Foster esq. of Apley Park, H. S. Pitt esq. of Kingswinford, near Dudley, Lieut.-Col. E. M. Wakeman and J. S. Corser esq. Field House, Wellington. The soil is various; subsoil, clay and gravel. The chief crops are wheat, turnips, barley, beans and clover. The population of the township in 1911 was 968 and of the ecclesiastical parish 877; area, 5,429 acres of land and 33 of water; rateable value, exclusive of Romsley, £6,017.

ANNSCROFT was formed into an ecclesiastical parish Nov. 29, 1872, from the parishes of Condover, St. Chad Shrewsbury and Meole Brace, and embraces the following places:—Annscroft, Great Lyth township, Exford's Green, Welbatch, Whitley and Hookagate, in the Western division of the county, hundred of Condover, Aitcham union, Shrewsbury county court district, rural deanery of Condover, archdeaconry of Ludlow and diocese of Hereford. Annscroft is on the road from Shrewsbury to Bishop's Castle, 2 miles south-east from Hanwood station on the Shrewsbury and Minsterley railway and 2 miles south-west from Shrewsbury. Christ Church, erected in 1869, is a building of stone, in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, nave, north aisle, north porch and a turret on the north-west containing one bell. The register dates from the year 1870. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £216, with residence, in the gift of trustees, and held since 1900 by the Rev. Edmund Algernon Wilson M.A. of New College, Oxford. The principal landowners are Mrs. Scott, of Betton Strange,

ASH MAGNA, ASH PARVA and **Old and New Woodhouses** are hamlets, formed into an ecclesiastical parish Oct. 15, 1844, from the parish of Whitchurch, in the Northern division of the county, hundred of North Bradford, union, petty sessional division and county court district of Whitchurch, rural deanery of Whitchurch, archdeaconry of Salop and diocese of Lichfield.

ASH MAGNA is on the road from Whitchurch to Market Drayton, 2 miles south-east from Whitchurch junction on the Shrewsbury and Crewe section of the London and North Western railway and 9 north-north-west from Market Drayton. Christ Church, erected in 1836, is a structure of brick with stone dressings, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and an embattled

ROMSLEY is a liberty, 1½ miles east. The principal landowners are J. S. Gibbons esq. and Messrs. John and Stephens Cresswell. The area is 1,375 acres; rateable value, £1,342; the population in 1911 was 105.

Great Lyth is a hamlet in the civil parish of Condover, about 1 mile south-east, but is now annexed to Annscroft for ecclesiastical purposes.

The register dates from the year 1837. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £168, with residence, in the gift of the rector of Whitchurch, and held since 1905 by the Rev. William Clough Hazledine M.A. of Oriel College, Oxford. A parish room was erected in 1911. Mrs. A. Wynne Corrie, of Park Hall, Oswestry, and Major Henry H. Heywood-Lonsdale, of Shavington, are principal landowners and owners of the manor. The surface is undulating; soil, gravel and
